# Exploring the Academic World: Inside Out

**EXACT Network Seminar, September 2012** 

Cologne, 15. - 28.09.2012: The twoweek EXACT Network Seminar on Academic Research Skills hosted by the University of Cologne presented a platform for academic discussion among experienced academics, twelve EXACT Early Stage Researchers and eight external participants working on their PhDs. Supervised by Geoffrey Edwards from the University of Cambridge and Robert Kissack from the Institut Barcelona d'Estudis Internacionals (IBEI), the event aimed to convey essential academic and research skills and to provide in-depth feedback on the participants' individual research.

The seminar was organised around three central elements. The first consisted of guest lectures by experienced researchers in the field of EU external relations. Ten experts from different European universities or think tanks presented their research and pointed out challenges they have encountered along the way. The second element centred on the participants' research. Based on the topics or methodology, the experts and participants were mutually assigned as commentators. The participants' presentations provided an opportunity for intensive feedback from the experts, the seminar directors, and the other participants. The third element of the seminar addressed 'practical' research skills such as academic teaching, publishing, funding, writing and interviewing.

The seminar was concluded with a public roundtable discussion entitled "EU Executive Powers and External Action". The discussants were the seminar directors, Robert Kissack and Geoffrey Edwards; Gianni Bonvicini from the Istituto Affari Internazionali; John Peterson from the University of Edinburgh; Wolfgang Wessels from the University of Cologne; and two EXACT fellows, Marlene Gottwald and Nicole Koenig. The roundtable was kicked off by a presentation by Nicole Koenig on the EU's role and coherence in the Libyan crisis.

The event was a fruitful mix of academic lecturing and sharing experiences in conducting research, but also allowed to receive valuable feedback on the work of the PhD researchers. In their concluding remarks Wessels, Edwards, and Kissack, gave practical tips and mentorship on how to proceed and finish timely with the research.

to address the Fellows directly with some – hopefully encouraging – words on their final spurt: You have got a lot done, met a lot of new and interesting people, learned a lot at your think tanks, and grown in con-

fidence. All the while, making steady progress on your dissertation! Obviously, the EXACT programme has asked a lot of all involved. But however much any Fellow has managed to write for their thesis, there is still time to finish it, and do so on time. Here a few friendly pointers:

• JUST KEEP WRITING

As I've told all of my supervisees repeatedly, any supervisor can give the most and most effective help by responding to text. It is only when we actually draft a chapter that we can tell where the gaps in our knowledge are, after which we can work to close them.

• IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE PERFECT

Especially, draft chapters that are 'finished enough' to allow your supervisor to help you can be very imperfect.

• TALK THROUGH YOUR DIFFICULTIES

If you get stuck on a specific issue, seek advice from other EXACT Fellows or PhD students at your institution. If that doesn't work, go see your supervisor. Whatever you end up doing post-EXACT, there are few prizes for starting a PhD that never got finished. So, look to the hero inside yourself and get finished!


### **EXACT** bi-annual thesis Workshop

Altogether, the cooperation of EXACT and the Think Tanks can be evaluated as extremely fruitful on all levels. A special remark was given by FIIA: "While acknowledging that the EXACT was a one off exercise, we feel that it might be worth of thinking ways to continue the project in one way or another."

Overall, the results of the EXACT Interim Think Tank Report show that both cooperation and coordination are of extreme value for the Think Tanks, the fellows and the EXACT programme. The fellows gained experience in working at the intersection of science and society and could intensify their academic profile. The Think Tanks profited not only from the additional academic input by the fellows but also from the network opportunities. Also from management perspective the Training Phase II can be evaluated as highly successful.

## TEPSA Pre-Presidency Conference in Dublin

The EXACT fellows participated in the TEPSA Pre-Presidency Conference in Dublin on 22 and 23 November 2012, hosted and organised by the IIEA, the Irish Institute of International and European Affairs, in collaboration with TEPSA.

The conference was opened by the welcome words of Brendan Halligan, Chairman of the IIIEA and discussed the future priorities and challenges of the upcoming Irish Council presidency in the first half of 2013. Wolfang Wessels, on behalf of TEPSA, stated his strong confidence regarding a successful and productive Irish presidency.

Four sessions involved representatives from different backgrounds such as politics, diplomacy, academia and the private sector. A numerous representation of Irish ministers and other speakers presented the programme of the Irish Council presidency. Session two focused on the current

crisis in the Eurozone and discussed the legal and political challenges it poses for the future of the EU. Session three addressed the EU digital agenda and EU energy policies. The fourth and last session dealt with the European Union as a global actor. Two EXACT fellows, Simon Stroß and Peter Valant, wrote the conference report which is now available on the TEPSA website.

The overall impression of the TEPSA Pre-Presidency Conference was extremely positive and enriching. Up-to-date information on a number of EU policy areas and fresh ideas to tackle the challenges ahead offered many chances for academic and policy exchange. Taking place in the famous halls of Dublin castle, the TEPSA Pre-Presidency Conference made the stay in Dublin for the EXACT fellows very memorable.

## EXACT Fellows at the UACES Annual Conference in Passau

Two fellows presented their research at the 42nd UACES Annual Conference, which took place in Passau early September 2012.

Leonhard den Hertog presented a paper co-authored with Joanna Parkin and Sergio Carrera from CEPS on the three EU home affairs agencies in the external dimension of EU migration pollicy: Frontex, Europol and the European Asylum Support Office. Leonhard argued that their specific Home Affairs nature, such as their 'experimental governance' strategies, poses specific challenges to individuals on the move. In the paper they show how some of

the activities carried out by these agencies negatively affect foundational EU principles and rights. As a consequence, 'accountability' theories in Agency literature have to be reconsidered.

Niklas Helwig presented on the High Representative's capability-expectations gap. While the expectations towards the redesigned post of the EU High Representative are high, its actual capabilities are limited, as the post is confronted with the prerogatives of the European Commission and the member states in many aspects of EU foreign policy. However, it can use its position at the

heart of EU foreign-policy making to offer co-leadership with its EU partners and thus to overcome the capability-expectations gap. Niklas also presented on a separate panel on CFSP performance after the treaty of Lisbon. The various panels and round tables offered an opportunity to learn about the latest research in EU studies and to meet scholars in this field. Beside the conference there was time to discover the picturesque town in lower Bavaria, where IIz and Inn meet the Danube.

## Inside EXACT: the (former) Institute for World Economics (IWE)

IWE has been a long-standing part-



ner in many European projects and has offered

excellent research and collaboration on all kinds of economic and political issues. Since a few months it has merged with the Research Centre for Economic and Regional Studies of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. This section highlights some of the activities and characteristics of the Institute.

The research it undertakes covers all areas of economic policy which include, to name but a few: global financial regulation, EU-China trade relations and EU's economic and financial development. Of course, in many of those activities the focus is on the impact these developments have on Hunga-

ry and on the Central and Eastern European EU Member States at large. In the newly merged Research Centre four new departments have been created: 1) Global Questions, 2) EU Studies, 3) East-Central Europe and 4) non-European economies. This guarantees a global outlook and wide expertise. The team is composed of a good mix of young and experienced researchers, with several young researchers also combining their policy analysis work at IWE with writing a dissertation at one of Hungary's universities.

In October and December 2012, EXACT Fellow James Nyomakwa-Obimpeh participated in workshops in Addis Ababa (Ethiopia) and Accra (Ghana) organized by the European Union and African Union Commissions.

The workshops aimed to promote cooperation among higher education institutions in Africa and in Europe. The EXACT Fellow has been contributing to ongoing policy dialogues between European and African policy makers especially in the promotion of quality assurance mechanisms among universities and higher educational institutions on both continents.

The workshop in October 2012 dealt with the role of academic and research cooperation in generating knowledge exchange. Taking place in Addis Ababa, the workshop brought together practitioners from both continents. They discussed examples of good practice of academic cooperation and research collaboration which could serve as models and orientation for higher education institutions. The workshop ended with a declaration on modalities for a stronger cooperation between Europe and Africa in higher education.

The workshop in Accra with the theme "Linking institutional evaluation practices, quality rating mechanisms and reinforcing quality assurance at continental level" took place on the 18-19 December 2012. This workshop brought together experts working on quality assurance from Africa and Europe to identify the need common criteria for quality assurance on a continental level. It highlighted the fragmentation of quality assurance practices in Africa and has prepared the way for a follow-up conference on a similar issue expected in May 2013 in Gabon.

## EXACT researcher in action: Doing interviews far away

Conducting interviews in Central Asia is surprisingly easy once a number of daunting obstacles have been overcome: the language barrier, restricted access to potential interviewees and limited freedom of speech. Extra patience is thus needed as the fruits of one's work are not borne as speedily as in European capitals. Of course, Central Asian countries vary substantially and consequently the degree to which the interviewer is confronted with these snags differs across the board. As I focused on Kazakhstan and Kyrgyzstan and thereby did not have to deal with the real "baddies" of Central Asia, my experience was only painful at times. Those moments of discomfort largely stemmed from complex Russian discourses which were beyond my grasp and cumbersome security procedures artificially wedged between me and my interviewee.

However, a handful of strategies enabled me to overcome most of the hurdles I came across. Firstly, I prepared all my interviews well, usually with a Russian native speaker. Secondly, I used the network of contacts I had established during my time in the region to facilitate access to desired interviewees. This significantly sped up the process. The final hurdle, that of freedom of speech, was harder to skirt around and I had to be more selective. In Kazakhstan, civil servants are likely to provide you with the latest government propaganda, while civil society based in the capital has equally been co-opted. Luckily, Almaty (the former Kazakh capital) and Kyrgyzstan, were more open in this regard and I had the opportunity to speak to a number of brave and inspirational individuals.



#### Visiting Scientist: Prof. Brigid Laffan

In the third and final phase of EXACT, the fellows will receive support for the finalisation part of their Ph.D. from Prof. Brigid Laffan. Prof. Laffan of the College of Human Sciences, University College Dublin, is joining the EXACT team from February 2013 on. She brings in her academic expertise, her professional experience as lecturer, her experience in shaping the debates on European integration and a wide network of contacts. Together with the fellows she will carry out inter alia a PhD progress workshop in Edinburgh and also prepare the EXACT Final Conference in July 2013.
